

The spring of 2021 began with large amounts of snowfall and rain. This created one of the greenest springs and summers Northern Colorado has seen in years. With the abundance of vegetation came a boom in the population of small mammals, insects, and song birds...aka prey.

During this time, humans were still in lockdown or in quarantine waiting (im)patiently for our COVID vaccinations or simply staying home to avoid the virus.

These conditions created the perfect setting for a boom in raptor populations, and we have seen a chain reaction at RMRP.

Raptors thrived this spring with an abundance of prey and a lack of human interaction which gave space for the mating pairs to produce above-average clutch sizes in the nest, which then fledged an enormous number of inexperienced young to begin their lives in the wild.

Then the young, naïve raptors and the torrent of wet weather, gave the window of opportunity for the abundance of mosquitos to bring West Nile Virus cases to the forefront over the summer months at a higher rate this year than last.

With the confluence of these factors, RMRP has had the busiest summer that we have seen in years. This has also set us on track for one of the top three record admission years in our 34-year history. With the astounding amount of immature raptors that have been taken from the skies, along with adults, we have received over 25 new raptor patients in a given week that need your help.

As humans cautiously begin to return to our "pseudo-normal" lives, RMRP is still maintaining vigilance of COVID precautions due to break-through cases and guidelines set forth by Colorado Parks and Wildlife. Our volunteer numbers are limited and with our small but mighty staff, we are all working an unprecedented number of hours to give quality care for our patients, Educational Ambassador raptors, and not to mention our outreach for education and fundraising in this inordinately busy summer.

Red-tailed Hawk hit-by-car, stuck in grill, survives and returns to the wild.

It seemed almost impossible when a call came in to our 24/7 Raptor Emergency Line in May of 2021. A Red-tailed Hawk had been hit by a car so mercilessly that he almost disappeared into the vehicle's grill. When the Good Samaritans sent us the photo, we couldn't believe he was still alive! We would like to thank Colorado Parks & Wildlife Officer, Mike Grooms for transporting this raptor to us.

The hawk was underweight, probably because he had an old injury to his left shoulder which made it hard for him to hunt. As a result, he most certainly was scavenging roadkill as an easy meal when he was hit, resulting in **additional trauma** to his left shoulder and many wounds on his chest.

The Red-tail had many strikes against him but it was our duty to ensure he had every chance to return to the wild. He went through many months of healing and physical therapy. During his time of recuperation at RMRP, this hawk served outstanding double duty as a patient and a role model. While healing, he helped rear baby Red-tailed Hawks, demonstrating raptors could be fierce and formidable in every way despite any challenges they may face.

Following over 100 days in rehabilitation, this hawk regained full use of his damaged wing. He received his Second Chance at Freedom with a glorious return to the wild.
