The Gift of Freedom

In August 2021, the Wyoming Game & Fish officers in Torrington, WY rescued a young Golden Eagle that was unable to fly. The youngster was then transferred down to Cheyenne Pet Clinic where he was cared for until permits came through to bring the gorgeous Golden across state lines to the Rocky Mountain Raptor Program.

The Golden Eagle was a "young of the year" bird, hatched in the spring. He had an old injury to his right shoulder, making it hard for him to fly and hunt. **He was thin and battered from trying to survive despite his injury.**

Food was this young Golden's top priority! He ate every meal with great satisfaction, *finally* filling his empty belly.

With lots of nutritious food and time to rest, his damaged shoulder healed. It took several weeks, but he gained back the weight and muscle he lost after his injury. In top condition, it was time to go home.

65 days after he came through our doors, the Golden Eagle was taken to a release site near Soapstone Prairie where the youngster would have lots of space and available prey.

When released, the Golden took a step out of the transport carrier and took a few seconds to orient himself. Then, with a lift of wings, he let the wind take him into the skies once more.

Great Horned Owl

This Great Horned Owl was rescued suffering from dehydration, starvation, and he had a lot of broken feathers. The owl was very dirty and covered in asphalt. After over ten weeks of healing, a good bath, regaining muscle mass, and growing in a whole new tail, this owl was returned to the wild!

American Kestrel

Found entangled in baling twine and dangling by her right wing, this little female American Kestrel had a lot of trauma to heal. With medication to increase blood-flow and laser light therapy to injury site and some medication for pain, she is doing really well and recovering nicely. She greatly enjoys room-service! Eat up little girl! We hope you can return to the wild soon!





Cooper's Hawk

Unable to fly, this young Cooper's Hawk had trauma to his left shoulder that was very slow to heal. After many weeks of healing, he was started on passive range of motion therapy to help his wing regain strength and flexibility. He is starting to fly again, and recently moved into a larger enclosure to work on his flight muscles and maneuverability.
