In With a Bang That didn't let up!

Busy spring began with the admission of 13 hatch-year Great Horned Owls that could not be re-nested. That was a big start for busy season! Young owls receive tons of parental care from spring until fall, so without their wild families we have to raise them right! Lots of food, very feisty, and several rounds through "Rat College" had these 13 owls ready to go! These owls were all returned to the wild for their Second Chance at Freedom in September.

As the pace of admissions continued through the summer, a single day could see five or six raptors come through our doors. Most admissions were immature raptors who encountered their first busy roadway, debilitating disease, or became separated from their parents.

On September 5th, we also released 11 immature Swainson's Hawks that will soon make their first migration south to Argentina for the winter. These young hawks are released into giant groups of Swainson's, known as "kettles." The adults in the kettles will guide the inexperienced hawks thousands of miles to their wintering grounds.

Diagnostics Sponsor

RMRP monitors West Nile Virus in raptors with the partnership of Ebel Laboratory at Colorado State University. Through their cooperation in testing, we have confirmed WNV in 56 patients. Ebel Labs donates these tests during the summer months, and in 2022 alone they have studied over 170 samples. That equals \$7,650 in diagnostic testing donated to RMRP! Thank you for helping the raptors in our care and in the future!

Spring migration brought the threat of High Pathogenic Avian Influenza to our state and facility. We combat the spread of that disease with stringent biosecurity protocols. A handful of raptors that died on admission or were dead on arrival tested positive for the virus. Because of our strict adherence to safety, the virus has not affected the birds already in our care.
