

Many Hands Save More Lives

While flying across the interstate frontage road near Wellington, Colorado on a crisp fall day, an adult Red-tailed Hawk (RTHA) was hit by a car. Several people saw the bird on the road, and one couple stopped and wrapped the bird in a blanket and rushed it to the closest facility, Northern Colorado Wildlife Center. NoCo Wildlife thankfully stabilized the bird and drove it down the road a few miles to us.

The raptor had suffered a head injury and abrasions to its feet, but further examination revealed an old fracture of the left metacarpus (wrist) and previous damage to the left eye which compromised visual perception. So, sometime in the past this bird was injured, survived, and was 'making a living' in the wild before it was hit again. Raptors often hunt and eat roadkill near highways, and this one was likely struck this time because of limited vision in the left eye.

Now only 9 days into rehabilitation, it is stable, alert, in good body condition, but not a cooperative eater, even with the great menu we offer! Adult RTHA's sometimes will not immediately eat well when coming into human care. It is currently living in our Rehabilitation complex and under day-to-day evaluation. The prognosis at this point is still guarded.

Swainson's Second Chance

In the heat of the summer a young Swainson's Hawk was found unable to fly because his head was oddly...upsidedown! This is called torticollis, where the neck muscles have a neural deficit causing the head to twist upsidedown or be tilted. This can be caused by illness or injury.

Past experience has given us insight into treating this condition. In 2015, RMRP and our amazing vets published a research paper on treating torticollis with physical therapy. We have since added anti-vertigo medications in tandem with physical therapy.

With therapy and medication, we saw this hawk improve in just seven days!

The young Swainson's is doing well and he will overwinter at RMRP. We hope he continues to improve and he can be released at the end of next summer for his first migration to Argentina!
