Fighting Avian Influenza Protecting Colorado's Feathered Communites

Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza (HPAI) is a highly contagious viral disease that has been wreaking havoc on bird populations in the United States and worldwide. While many of us may be familiar with the way Avian Influenza affects domesticated poultry and other farm birds, there is another group of birds that is being hit especially hard by this disease: raptors.

Raptors, or birds of prey, are highly susceptible to Avian Influenza. This is because they are at the top of the food chain and often feed on other birds, some of which may be infected with the virus. In addition to this, many raptor species are migratory, which means that they are at risk of contracting Avian Influenza in their wintering grounds before carrying the virus back to their breeding sites.

The effects of HPAI on raptors can be devastating. Some species, such as the endangered California Condor, have already seen significant declines in population due to this disease. Others, like eagles, falcons and hawks are also at risk.

At the RMRP, we have experienced 44 cases since September, and only one has survived.

We urge you to take action to help protect our raptor populations from the effects of HPAI. Some ways you can help include supporting organizations that work to conserve raptors, reporting any sick or dead birds you may come across to your local wildlife agency, and practicing good hygiene and biosecurity measures when handling birds or visiting areas frequented by birds.

Let's work together to ensure that our raptor populations remain healthy and vibrant for generations to come.

Should You Be Worried About HPAI?Prevention is Key

At the RMRP, we adhere to strict biosecurity protocols to protect all of the raptors in our care and the humans that provide the care. Although your overall risk from the current HPAI outbreaks is low, it is important that you take preventive measures around infected or potentially infected birds/poultry to prevent the spread of Avian Influenza viruses to humans, to other birds/poultry, or to other animals including pets. This applies not just to workplace or wildlife settings but potentially to household settings where people have backyard flocks or pet birds with potential exposures to wild or domestic infected birds.

Welcome our Newest Ambassador! A Bald Eagle Joins the Team

In November 2022, a one-year old male Bald Eagle was transferred to RMRP as our newest Educational Ambassador. He was found injured in a field in Monroe County, WV near Blacksburg in the spring of 2021, just 100 feet from a busy road. His rescuers bravely contained and brought him to Three Rivers Avian Center for rehabilitation, where their rehabilitation team found he had suffered a break to his right wing, possibly due to being hit by a vehicle. Surgery and pinning of the fracture site was done, but unfortunately his injury left him unable to fly.

Four different transport plans to bring him from West Virginia were made, including flight. Three of them fell through due to weather and then, finally a break in the storms! The RMRP's Education and Outreach Coordinator, Jessica Miller, along with two family members that volunteered to help set out on a multi-day journey, dubbed "Operation Eagle." After 47 hours of driving and 2,917 miles, he was finally at his new home at the RMRP in Fort Collins, CO!

The new arrival Ambassador Eagle has since begun a specialized training plan, developed just for him, to help him learn the skills he needs to be a confident and comfortable Educational Ambassador.
